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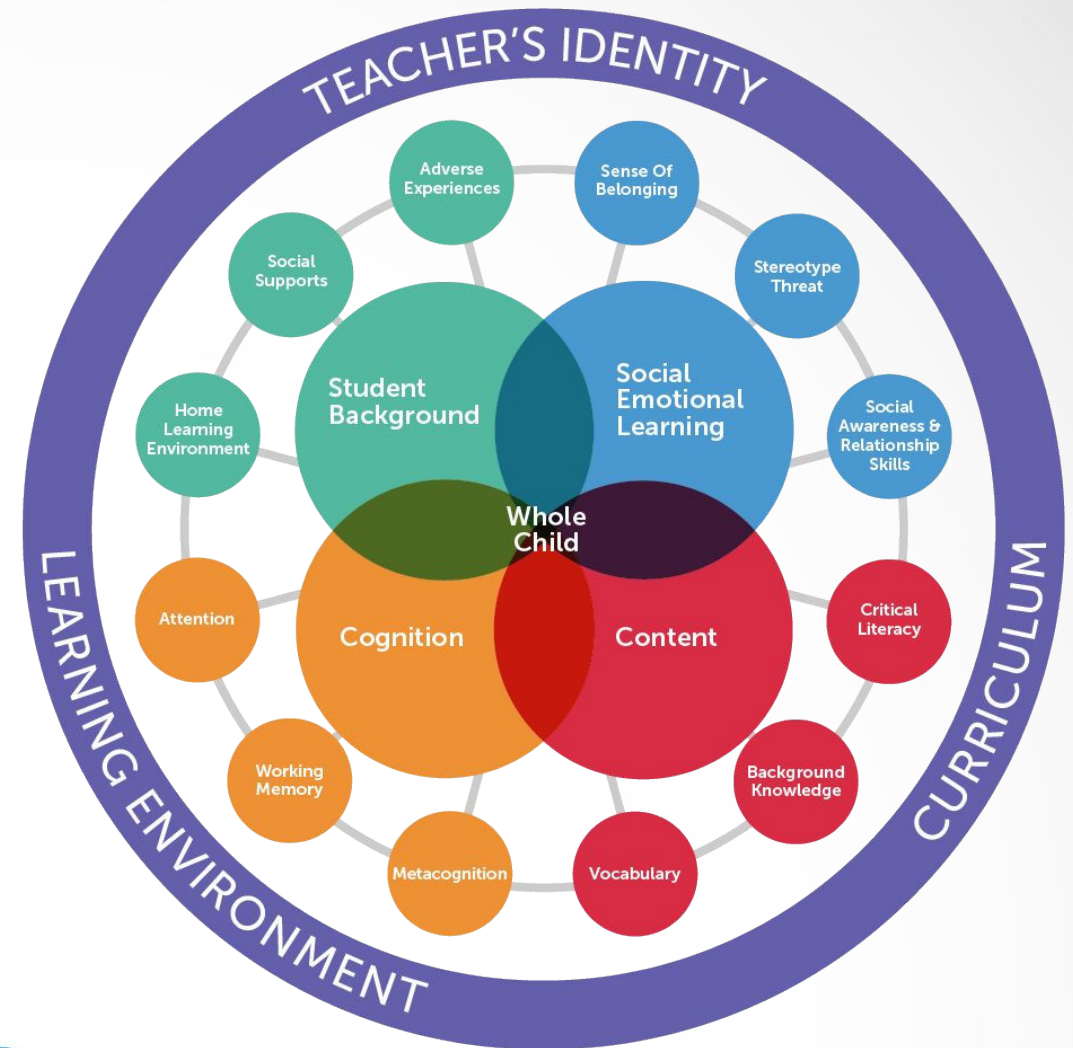
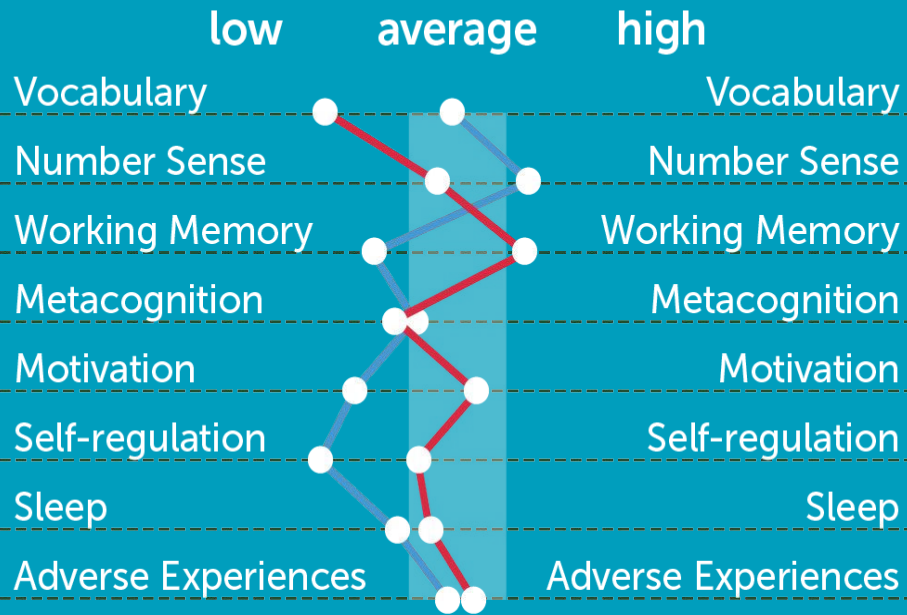

# Culturally Responsive Practice

At Digital Promise, we define culturally responsive practice as a research-based approach that connects students' cultures, languages, and life experiences to what they learn in school and pushes back on dominant narratives about historically marginalized people. Culturally responsive practice **builds cognitive capacity** and **academic mindset**. It does this by **helping teachers develop their own awareness for how to connect students' funds of knowledge to content and academic experiences**.

**Research has shown that even brief professional development for educators on the science of learning and memory, and how it connects to classroom practices, can have vast benefits for teachers' confidence and understanding of instructional approaches, including showing an increase in student-centered approaches and improvements to lesson plans**

**(Howard-Jones et al., 2020; Schwartz et al., 2019).**

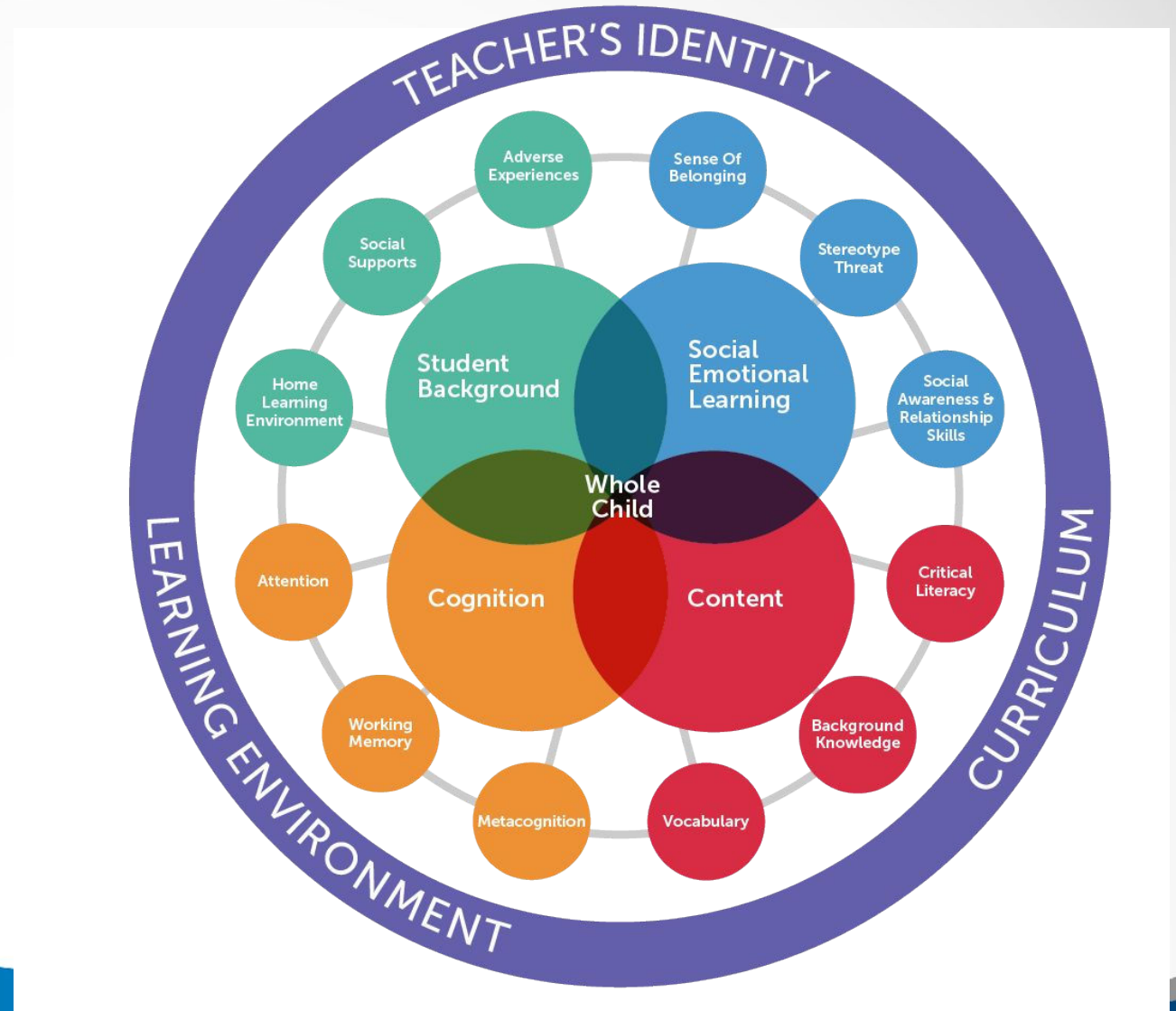

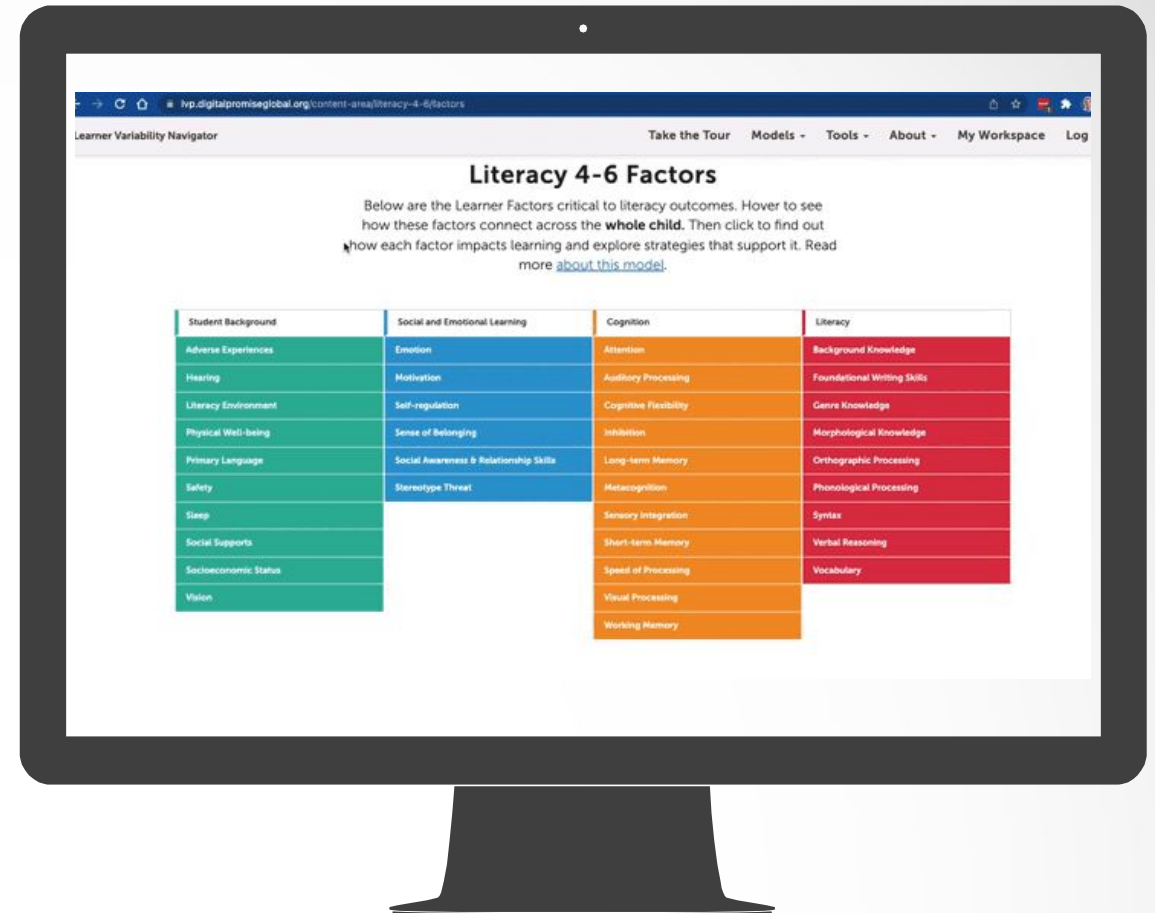
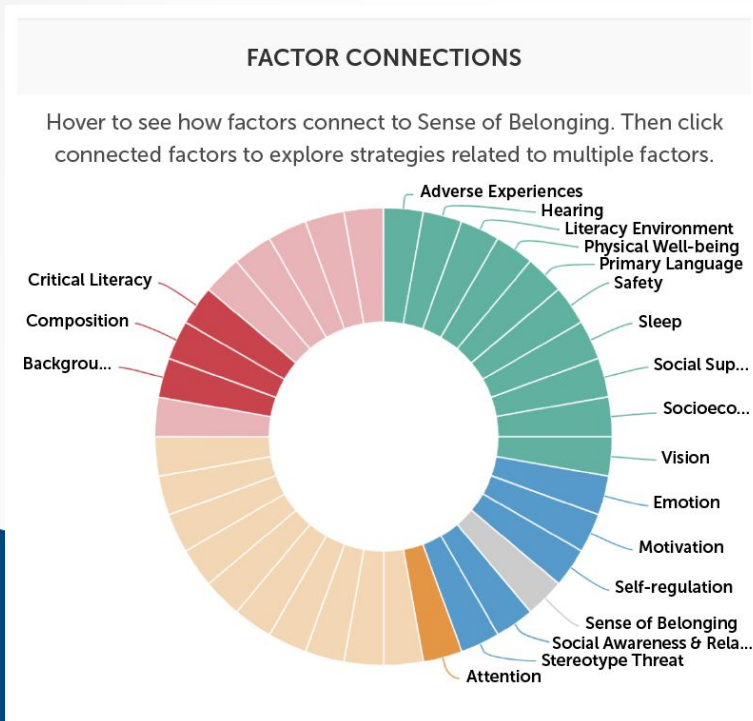
## Culturally Responsive Teaching
